#### The "Birth" of Immanuel

On August 26, 1967, members of Immanuel United Methodist Church, along with Bishop Ward, held a groundbreaking ceremony on this very spot. Today, fifty years later, we celebrate our heritage and look toward the future.

The church became a reality on May 19, 1968 as 338 members came to worship at the very first service held here. It had been four years since they had explored the very idea of finding a new church location with Reverend Webster Melcher, then pastor of the First Methodist Church of Camillus. At the time, Camillus township was booming – streets and houses appeared where there had once been farm lands. With the influx of new families, many with children, the need soon arose for new schools, shopping centers, and, of course, Sunday school space. Space for children in the basement of the First Methodist soon became inadequate, and members were faced with finding a viable solution. Because of the age of the existing church and lack of existing space, it seemed the wise choice to relocate.

A committee started exploring the neighborhood for available property on which to build. Some of the locations were the Prior Farm, where St. Joseph's now stands, the corner of Windcrest Drive, a space on Onondaga Road, and a Kasson Road lot near the golf course. After due consideration, an option was taken on the Kasson Road site. Subsequently, it was purchased on June 21, 1964. The members contacted the bank for a mortgage for the church building; however, there were no families that could contribute a large enough amount to cover the loan. The bank, then, asked for a show of faith. On January 5, 1965 Royce Newell called 11 families to meet at the High School. The families agreed to pledge \$5 a week for four years. On this show of faith, the bank agreed to deed the land. This was recorded on July 8, 1965.

On October 23, 1966 District Superintendent Donald Wright and Bishop W. Ralph Ward met with the congregation and a new church society was formed. The charter members of the new church are also listed in this book. A name had to be chosen for the church. Five suggested names were: St. John's, Grace, Immanuel, Church of the Bells, and Bethany Methodist. The members chose to use two of these. From that time on until the church was completed, the charter members shared the church in the village. Leonard B. Whitney (Eli) was to be the minister of the new church. The architect, Gordon Schopfer, was chosen and plans for a modern structure were approved. Because the charter members could not finance the church of their dreams, they needed to prioritize. They chose to invest in the future and build a Sunday school wing for the children, using an all-purpose room as their sanctuary.

After the groundbreaking ceremony on August 26, 1967, the church took shape quickly. Our beautiful church, Immanuel United Methodist Church of the Bells, was soon finished. The first service was on May 19, 1968, and our church was consecrated on June 2 in that same year.

The congregation continued to meet in Fellowship Hall and to prosper. On May 19, 1988 a mortgage burning ceremony was held. Once again, more space was needed and plans were made to build a "real" sanctuary. In 1993 a building committee was formed and a design selected. On July 20, 1995, District Superintendent

Robert Stoppert and Pastor Wendy Rhodehamel officiated at the groundbreaking ceremony. Construction was completed in time for Christmas Eve on December 24, 1995. The consecration with Bishop Hae-John Kim was January 7, 1996.

Building the new sanctuary spurred a growth spurt in the church's membership and worship attendance that continues to this day. By the grace of God, Immanuel has become one of the most active churches on the western edge of Syracuse and one of the leading United Methodist churches in the region.

#### Story of the Bells

Our second name "Church of the Bells" became a reality in June 1966 when the very first bell was obtained from Italy Valley Methodist Church. It was cast by the Rumsey Company of Seneca Falls. It was another whole year before the second bell was obtained from the Sterling Baptist Centennial Church.

The bell that once graced the roof over the entrance to the church, and rung by MANY enthusiastic children through the years, was a gift of the Royce Newell family in June 1967. It came from Venice Center and weighed about 200 lbs.

The next two bells were also obtained in June 1967. One came from Morgan Road Methodist Church and another from South Columbia Methodist Church. They each weighed approximately 1500 lbs. and were of steel alloy.

Dedication of the Bell Tower was held in June of 1972 in memory of Paul Walton. Then later in 1972 three more bells were added. One came from the Freeman Avenue Methodist Church in Solvay, the second from Westminister Presbyterian Church of Syracuse, and the third from the First Ward Methodist Church of Syracuse.

In May 1973 a bell was obtained from the First M.E. Church in Pulaski. It was purchased by their congregation in 1884. The tenth bell was from St. Andrews Episcopal Church at Deys Landing. Then, in the spring of 1977 the last bell was acquired from Wiscoy Methodist Church in Portageville through the efforts of Rev. Dean Richardson.

All of the bells were obtained through the inspiration and tremendous dedication of Rev. L.B. (Eli) Whitney and especially of Royce, Caroline, William and Julie Newell. Many hilarious tales were told of their experiences with the rickety bell tower ladders, cobwebs and cupolas inhabited for years by pigeons. Recognition must also be given for help by Mike Tambroni with his wrecker, Floyd House for being a willing helper, Earl Hudson for lending special equipment and the use of Harlan Hudson's barn to store the bells until we had a Bell Tower, and Robert Scudder for obtaining, through the telephone company, all of the supporting poles for the tower.
